Launch of New Academic Programmes

Workshop on "Vision Care and Sign Language"



A one-day workshop on "Vision Care and Sign Language" was organized on 6th

• Demonstrations on Orientation and Mobility (O&M) techniques were conducted, enabling participants to understand the movement and navigation methods used by persons with vision impairment.



- Training was provided on **basic etiquette and functional sign language**, emphasizing respectful and effective communication with persons with hearing impairment.
- Participants learned basic functional communication skills, enhancing their ability to



interact inclusively with persons with disabilities.

• A special session on **eye care and preventive practices** sensitized attendees to the importance of maintaining good vision health.

The workshop successfully sensitized the participants to the needs and challenges faced by persons with visual

and hearing impairments, while also equipping them with practical knowledge and communication tools to foster an inclusive environment.

Government Law College, Trichy, organized a comprehensive and impactful mega event on 28th February 2017. The event, which brought together students, faculty, officials, and members of the public, comprised the following components:

Exhibition on Science and Technology for the Specially Abled

The event began with an **exhibition showcasing the latest assistive technologies and devices** designed to support individuals with disabilities in

- o Learning support tools for children with intellectual disabilities

Dr. M. Prabavathy, the event coordinator, personally guided the dignitaries and guests through each display, explaining the **functionality and benefits** of each device. The event also highlighted the **innovations developed by research institutions and grassroots technologists** to support accessibility.



Demonstration of Talent by Specially Abled Children



As part of the exhibition, children with special needs showcased their unique talents in areas such as art, music. crafts. and performance. Their skills served as a **powerful** reminder of the capabilities and potential individuals with disabilities when provided the right support and encouragement.

The Deputy Commissioner took time to **interact warmly with the specially abled students**, offering motivational words and **presenting them with gifts** as tokens of appreciation for their courage and talent. In his keynote address, he emphasized the **importance of inclusion** and remarked that **participating in this event was a truly fulfilling experience**.

Signature Campaign for Inclusion and Equal Rights

Following the exhibition, a Signature Campaign was launched to express solidarity with the



cause of equal rights and inclusion for persons with disabilities. Mr. Mayilvaganan was the first to sign the campaign, setting the tone for the rest of the participants.

• The campaign saw active participation from students, faculty, professionals, and the general public, who signed to show their commitment to supporting accessibility, dignity, and opportunity for the differently abled.

This symbolic act served as a collective

pledge toward building a more inclusive society, reinforcing the constitutional and moral responsibility of ensuring equity for all.



Human Chain for Inclusion
